Recently, Staton Tate and I were discussing the new carbide woodturning tools. He mentioned that there was a company in Homewood that sold carbide cutting tools. I recently called the company, Carbide Depot at 119 Citation Ct. in Homewood. They sell three round carbide cutters that are used for soft metal and wood. They have screws and taps for each size of carbide cutter. The following is a list of sizes and costs:

8mm cutter \$6.15 each Screw \$2.50 Tap \$8.28 10mm cutter \$7.22 each Screw \$2.50 Tap \$7.24

12mm cutter \$12.00 each Screw \$2.50 Tap \$7.24 Cutters are sold in packages of 5. Screws and taps are sold one each.




Some of Rudy's work

He has demonstrated at the AAW National Symposium and many local chapters, and also teaches at craft schools including Arrowmont and the John C. Campbell Folk School. His work is in many public and private collections as well as juried and invitational exhibitions.

TURNING AROUND AMERICA

I have been on the road with Turning Around America for nine months. I am currently at my residency at The Philadelphia Turning Center. I will be here for two months, working with a group of artists on a body of collaborative work. It is like a creative think tank. The program is called the International Turning Exchange. I am honored to have been chosen. The two months ahead of me will give me a chance to processes what Turning Around America has accomplished so far. I have taught 2084 people in 32 states. I have traveled 21,000 miles. The van has been passed on to Jenn for the summer. She will continue on our project as she travels through New England teaching, writing and connecting with other artists. In August she will come back to Philadelphia, drop off the van and fly home to Santa Fe, while I travel on to teach in Maine. People often ask me how this Project has impacted me. It would take an entire book to answer that question. The last nine months have been so fast paced and full it has been difficult to stop and reflect on all that has occurred during the journey.

I constantly receive e-mails from parents of kids telling me of the impact my one day at their child's school has had on them. I have also had wonderful letters from the kids and adults students as well. I am constantly aware that I could never have achieved this successes if there were not people supporting and believing in my and Jenn's vision. The generosity extended to Turning Around America has been


incredible, from friends and strangers who have donated money, gift cards, time and energy, to complete strangers who


When I started this project I wanted to teach as many people as I could the simple act of making an object. I envisioned myself as a modern day Johnny Appelseed, planting the idea of the importance of not forgetting hand skills in our computer culture. It has become so much more for me. I have loved working with the young people; their excitement is so contagious it has really spurred me on over all the miles. The teachers have been wonderful. They are all so surprised with how much the kids can accomplish in an hour. Many teachers tell me they have never seen their kids so focused. It

does not surprise me. These kids sit for hours in class and then in front of computers. The physical activity involved in woodworking is very exciting to them. When they are done they hold a tangible object in their hands that is a physical representation of their individual capabilities. Who wouldn't be excited? Adults are the same; they just keep their feelings closer to their chests.
