I was born in Illinois, raised in Michigan and spent 28 years in Massachusetts before moving to Tennessee in 1995. I worked as a university professor for 40 years before retiring in 2007. I have MS in Math 1968, a MS in Computer Science 1972, and a DSC in Computer Science 1993. I retired in 2007 and started turning soon after that.

I started turning pens, but soon wanted to turn bowls. So upgrading lathes was a must. I have a Powermatic 3520B and way too many tools. I enjoy turning many things. As a member of four AAW chapters I do a lot of President's challenges and often spend way too much time on them.

I also enjoy doing demos and have done demos on turning Christmas ornaments, boxes with threaded lids, a toothpick dispenser, emerging bowls, maze coin puzzle boxes, and what I call multi-axis hollowing.

The class will give participants the opportunity to turn the 'emerging bowl' that will be demonstrated during the morning session.

Jared Bruckner has agreed to stay and lead us through the process of creating these unique turnings. To participate, I ask that you have intermediate turning skills and experience with 'open air' turning, relative proficiency with turning a bowl and use of a scraper. I encourage you to view one or more of the youtube videos available online to acquaint yourself with the overall aspects of the turning and variations available. Blacksmith Opportunity

Vulcan Forge would be happy to conduct a special class for our members on May 25, from 9am until approx. 4pm at Tannehill Iron Works State Park near Bessemer. We will cover steel selection, heat treating, forging techniques, and how to have an affordable forge and tools. This course is designed for wood workers to be able to make tools at a fraction of the cost with readily available tools and materials. Cost will include a one year membership in Vulcan Forge, additional classes at no charge, materials and tools furnished for the class, membership in Alabama Forge Council, newsletter (very good), and you should leave with wood working tools you will have made. Lunch will be provided for an additional small charge. I believe that will be \$25 for the class and \$6 for lunch plus cost of admission to the park. Students will need to wear clothing made of natural material (cotton, linen, wool, leather) and have safety glasses. This class will be smaller than our last class to insure better personal instructions and more anvil time. Class is limited to 12-that is 2 students per anvil per instructor. Women are welcome and one of our smiths is a woman. Just as at our turning meetings, people may have items for sale. Additional information about the Saturday afternoon class with Jared Bruckner: (Continued from page 1)

I will prepare the blanks with a tenon to be used in the first mounting. We will be turning bowls about 2.5" to 3" in diameter. I will also bring 6 wooded face-plates for the second mounting. We will be using hot glue for the second

Students will need a lathe with chuck (normal jaws) and some sort of center for the tail stock (it does not have to rotate as it will be used only to position the wood). In addition to a face shield they will need a bowl gouge (1/2" shaft with 3/8" flute recommended), a 3/8" detail or spindle gouge, and an interior bowl scraper (bowl will be about 2.5" to 3" diameter). A 1/2" or larger square scraper (or 1/2" or larger skew to be used as a scraper) might be helpful. If they have a hot glue gun they should bring it. I will have mine and we can share if anyone does not have one.

If the location allows for sanding they should bring sandpaper. (THAT PART WE ARE LIMITED ON AT THE CENTER!) Power sanding equipment with 2" sanding disks might be helpful, but not needed. Sanding might be better be done at home after the tenon is cut off. They will not be able to sand that side anyway and the only part that can be sanded on the lathe is the bowl and the outside of the bowl will need hand sanding anyway.

I will bring the wood blanks and will have my tools (and I will bring extras) if someone does not have something.

- 2. **Turn for Troops:** The AWA is joining with Woodcraft in the project to turn pens for US Troops on active duty or in rehabilitation. This project is in its 14th year, totaling 146,118 pens so far.

"Woodcraft is again depending on the hundreds of volunteers who show up each year to turn the beautiful pens that say 'thank you' in a very personal way to the military men and women who continue to keep the United States safe, while making tremendous sacrifices in their personal lives," president Jody Garrett said.

The project spans the whole year culminating on Veterans Day Nov 11.
