May Demo ~ Howard King - Turning Finials



In the early 1970s, my hobby was making wooden furniture. Eventually this led me to buy a lathe to do spindle turnings for furniture such as bed posts, fern stands, candle holders and stools. Later I got into turning segmented bowls as well as weed pots which lead me to turning bowls from solid wood. I gave up woodturning in the early 1990s and didn't turn much of anything until 2009 when my interest returned. I took a bowl turning class with Frank Bowers one weekend at Highland Woodworking in Atlanta. I had taken some bowl gouges which Frank looked at sadly and told me he would resharpen them for me with the "Irish Grind". Amazingly, he did it free hand. Later, Nick Cook came to Cullman to demonstrate and I watched him turn about 15 different things in one day. So I was hooked again. I have been

amazed at the advancements and the progress woodturning has achieved over the past twenty years. I have really learned a lot from the members of AWA and the programs that are offered every month as well as those at the North Alabama Woodturners. It is amazing how many great woodturners there are in the Birmingham group as well as in the Boaz group who freely share their expertise with us. It is very inspiring to see all the fantastic pieces that are brought to the meetings. I've made a lot of good friends and I'm very happy to be a member of both groups.



VULCAN FORGE BLACKSMITHING CLASS

Vulcan Forge would be happy to conduct a special class for our members on **May 5**, from 9 am to 4 pm at Tannehill Iron Works State Park near Bessemer. We will cover steel selection, heat treating, forging techniques and how to have an affordable forge and tools. This course is designed for wood workers to be able to make tools at a fraction of the cost with readily available tools and materials. Cost will include a one year membership in Vulcan Forge, additional classes at no charge, materials and tools furnished for the class, membership in Alabama Forge Council, newsletter (very good) and wood working tools you will have made. Lunch will be provided for an additional small charge. The charge should be around \$25 for the class and \$6 for lunch, plus the cost

of admission to the park. Students will need to wear clothing made of natural material (cotton, linen, wool, leather) and have safety glasses. This class will be smaller than our last class to insure better personal instructions and more anvil time. Space is limited to 12 - that is two students per anvil, per instructor. Women are welcome and one of our smiths is a woman. Just as at our turning meetings, people may have items for sale.
