He soon after bought him a bigger wood lathe to learn how to make larger items.

His father and grandfather have played a large role in teaching him how to work with different tools and how to use them safely. However much of his wood turning skills was learned by trial and error or watching YouTube. His mom encouraged him one day to try and make a bowl and he fell in love with the art of making wooden bowls and has been making them ever since. When he was 12 years old he entered a few of his bowls into the 4-H County Roundup In the freestyle showcase and won first place in Etowah County. We went on to compete in the regional level where he also won first place. At that time he was too young to compete at the state level but he hopes to try for that again this year now that he is a couple years older.

I have observed the club dynamics as I ran the AV these past few years and hopefully, I can build on what I've seen. I'd like to concentrate on two key areas for 2020:


The first is increasing the number of beginning and intermediate turners in the club. As someone not far removed from the beginning stage of turning, I can say that the AWA and you are critical to developing entry-level woodturners. Your encouragement and willingness to mentor these new-comers is essential for helping the club thrive and grow.

The second area is involvement from our advanced turners. You are the club's most valuable resource, and without your knowledge and experience we might as well shut the doors. As I know firsthand, what you consider routine can be an eye-opening revelation to a new turner. A simple discussion about the way you dry your green-turned items can lead to a beginner's first bowl that doesn't crack.

We'll be trying some new things this year with the goal of increasing both of the areas above. I hope you'll participate in these and give me your honest feedback, both good and bad. Hopefully, with your help, we can extend the club outside the walls of the Senior Center and encourage more group get-togethers at member's shops. I've found that those moments are when I really begin to enjoy woodturning.

As part of our 2020 goals to attract beginning/ intermediate turners and increase involvement for our advanced turners, the Board has unanimously voted to propose a new logo for the club. While the current logo has served us well since 1998, this new logo is more distinct and recognizable to woodturners. The new logo features a log cross-section with a lathe in front of the growth rings. The club name is wrapped around the log slice with our AAW chapter information on the lathe bed. Going forward, all materials and merchandise related to the club would be branded with the new logo. This includes new recognition items for members donating their time to the club (Officer shirts and volunteer logo items) and a new marketing tool (AWA bag at Woodcraft for new lathe owners). We would also be making logo shirts, caps, etc., available for members to purchase.

Rikon Lathe Model 70-100

This Rikon mini lathe model 70-100 has been used in our training classes for several years, but only one day per month, so relatively little mileage! Phil has inspected and tuned it to be sure it is in fine working order. This model has a 12" swing x 16" turn-able length, one-half HP motor, and 6 speed settings 430-3900. A new one costs \$499 at Woodcraft.
