## March demo: Phil Rose

Our guest demonstrator was Phil Rose from up-state New York. He demonstrated three different techniques in multiaxis turning.

First, he turned a budvase, mounted between centers, where the axis was shifted at only the base end, shifted only about 1/4" in one direction to turn a V-cut, then 1/4" off the center in the opposite direction for a second V-cut. Thus, he created a tilted disc near the bottom of the vase.




Second, he mounted a blank in a chuck to turn a goblet. After shaping and hollowing the cup, he loosened the chuck to tilt the blank slightly and re-tightened firmly. Here he started turning a section of the stem at a new axis. He repeatedly shifted the angle to turn more sections of the stem, all at different angles. He returned to



the original tenon to turn the base.

For the third project he mounted the blank between centers but shifted both ends so that the new axis was parallel to the original. He turned one face of the stem as a cove-bead-cove. Then he shifted the axis in the opposite parallel direction and turned the other face as a bead-cove-bead. Finally, he turned a transition at each end to a tenon which would later be joined to a goblet and a base.

For much of the turning he used a 1/2" detail gouge ground at a steep 35-degree angle which allows him to cut deep into an acute angle. He used the spindle roughing gouge for smooth cuts over long sections. He set his lathe speed fast, around 2400 rpm (but you should not use a speed where you are not comfortable or that introduces vibration; I've found 1200 to be a minimum).


## **COLLABORATION CORNER**

### March's Problem Piece

Suggestions for the walnut bowl voids included colored epoxy, brass/epoxy, abalone/epoxy, and just leaving them empty.

### April's Problem Piece

Howard King is having quite the cracking problem with this piece of cedar. Howard says, "The piece was



semi-dry and worked great to final form & shape. However, as I started hollowing the piece, numerous cracks started appearing. Numerous times of applying shellac then thin CA the cracks continue to increase & widen. Several more times of trying to stop the spread & widening of the cracks as I attempted to achieve a quarter inch wall thickness. I resorted to coating the inside walls with

Titebond glue, hoping this could hold the crashing to a minimum but the number of cracks increased the deeper I hollowed. Anyone has any ideas to save this piece from the

burn pile. It is 16 1/2" high & 9 1/2" diameter at widest part."

Let's keep in mind that Howard's idea of a 'burn pile' is a line of bowls waiting to have 400,000 burn marks put on them, one at a time, over the span of 23 days! (See Howard's masterpiece in last month's newsletter). Please send any suggestions for Howard to us and we'll pass them along, as well as publish them here next month. And remember to send in your problem pieces if you'd like some advice.
