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June Meeting Recap

We held our first in-person meeting since February 2020. While the Homewood Senior Center is still closed to rental groups, City Hardwoods graciously allowed us to meet in their facility. Scott Arnold put a great deal of effort into working out the technicalities of Audio/Visual, allowing members to attend on Zoom, hearing and seeing the participants in the room and vice-versa.

Scott reviewed our only two in-person meetings in 2020: First we had Slade LeCroy, 14 years old, demonstrate how he turns bowls. In February we had Sammy Long demonstrate thin turning and piercing. After that we met on Zoom and had a series of top-tier woodturning demonstrations including Cindy Drozda, Glenn Lucas, Mike Mahoney, Rudy Lopez, and many more.

On display we offered new items for sale: T-shirts, hats, and patches.

To allow extra time for visiting in person, we did not have a turning demonstration this time. Instead, the program was primarily Show and Tell. Carl Cummins described three pieces made from one section of ambrosia maple log: an end-grain bowl, a natural-edge bowl, and a vase. Sandy Bishop showed several pieces, most interesting was the set of nesting bowls made from a glued-together board. John Rhymes showed his bowl made from pecan and pens made from persimmon. Richard Serviss showed his lidded box. Jerry Hanchey showed his "Dizzy Bowl" in progress. Jerry also led a discussion of this month's question about chuck jaws (see article in Collaboration Corner). Ron Herbster showed several pieces that were turned, pieced, carved, and/or ink decorated. Ron also showed a partially turned piece of mesquite and asked for advice. The main advice was, "Don't use a mortise with expansion jaws in wood with cracks or voids. It has a good chance of breaking apart and flying off the lathe." Howard King showed his tall basket-illusion hollow form with more than 37,000 burns. Next Howard described his ordeal of acquiring a "\$300 burl" plus the ordeal of dealing with large voids in order to turn a spectacular hollow urn. Many more items were on display but not discussed.

Probably "a first" for an AWA meeting, a member announced his engagement!

COLLABORATION CORNER

June's Problem

Harvey Dowd sent in, "Thinking of purchasing my first chuck. Which is better, a straightsided or dovetail chuck."

This one really inspired some discussion! We received the following reply via email:

"I don't think one can simply say which is better, as you will get different opinions from different woodturners. I have heard professionals including Glenn Lucas and Ashley Harwood say they use only Vicmarc (dovetail). The AWA has only Oneway (straight). I have both, but I tend to use dovetail (Vicmarc and Nova) most of the time."

At the June meeting, one member led the discussion regarding the question with the majority of folks agreeing that a chuck with straight-sided serrated jaws would probably be best for wet wood, while the dovetail would be best for dry. It was agreed that the most important aspects of both would be that the shoulder of the jaws rests flat on the wood while not bottoming out the tenon in the chuck. For the dovetail, making sure the tenon or mortise is the correct size is imperative, so the entire jaw is clamping, not just the corners.


