Managing Green Wood

We often get the chance to collect fresh wood but either have to wait a long time before we can use it or watch it crack itself into firewood. During this talk I will attempt to lead you through a step-by-step process to avoid having your "free" wood go to waste and how to predict what a piece will look like when it has been turned.

This will be an information packed session and it often triggers a LOT of questions. I am happy to answer as many as I can you as long as you keep asking.

#### AUGUST MEETING RECAP



Our August guest demonstrator, Frank Penta of Chapel Hill NC, showed the process of laminating wood for turning. Laminating starts with the simple concept of cutting wood on a table saw into straight strips and gluing them togeth-

er. He showed how they can be cut, glued, recut, and glued again and again into an infinite variety of arrangements to make turning blanks with striking patterns of contrasting colored woods. He emphasised the simplicity and flexibility of the concept as he can turn them into candlesticks, peppermills, bowls, platters, and more, all from straight cuts on a table saw.

He went through the complete process for the "Lattice Bowl", arranging wood strips to make the blank, and turning the blank to the finished bowl.

His enthusiasm and energy were infectious, making for an inspiring demo.

### AUGUST'S PROBLEM

John McClane asks, "I always hear other woodturners talking about end grain and side grain. Can someone please explain the difference to someone who's new to turning?"

The easiest visualization is to picture yourself holding a bundle of drinking straws. The open ends of the straw are end grain. The part you are holding with your hand is the side grain. Now picture a log the same way. Most turned bowls are side grain since it offers the most strength. There are cases however where someone might turn a end grain bowl, which would show all of the growth rings around the bowl as if you were looking at the end of the log. While this is a nutshell version of the side grain vs. end grain discussion, if it has piqued your interest, please research it further or contact another member for advice.


