MEMBERS DUES MUST BE CURRENT TO BE INCLUDED IN THE BIRTHDAY LIST.




Our meeting place this month is Hardware Park (formerly Long-Lewis Hardware), downtown between 4th and 5th Ave. North. The exact address is

Decorating a tree for Children's of Alabama is a long-time important project for AWA. Our photo archive includes the 2005 tree which may have been the beginning of our partnership with Children's. It is 2022 now and time to get to work on our 18th Christmas tree (two years were missed during the pandemic).

Often, AWA's Christmas tree is the top seller donated to the hospital. Most important is that each ornament that you contribute to AWA's effort will support Children's work in serving the children of Alabama. Also, this community outreach project is critically important to receiving and maintaining a federal tax-exempt status.

The 2022 tree will be decorated, displayed, and auctioned in November by Children's. So now is the time for everyone to get to work.

At each monthly meeting from now through early October we will collect and display the ornaments with the maker's name attached. Come prepared to share because other members or the whole group may want to hear about your materials and process that you used.

International Wood Collectors Society Meeting

The IWCS meets every year around the Valentine's Day weekend at Lake Yale (Eustis) FL. Bill Calderwood is a member and provided this description:

There will be a wood miser set up on site to custom saw sizes and shapes wanted. In the past there have been ancient virgin cypress and pine logs recovered from rivers. Members bring a variety of logs to be sawn and sold at the Thursday auction. one can buy material during the week off the saw and have it custom sawn to spec. It would be green.

At the Thursday auction (historically an all-day affair) sizes range from pen blank size to 18-20" log sections. I get most of my walnut there in 2+ inch square or live edge random width and length planks. I remember buying a walnut plank about 2" thick 12" wide 4' long for less than \$10. Prices vary with quality. Some pieces are quarter-sawn. Most of this wood is dry. The premium pieces are on sale all week at a silent auction. Usually 3-4 auctions per day. Wednesday or Thursday evening there is an indoor auction of crafts, tools and supplies donated by members and supply companies.

There are more or less continuous woodturning demos all week. Some members display their crafts in the main hall.

Consider attending for a day or two or all week and joining the membership. There are on-site 3 meals a day and on-site motel-style lodging may still be available. RV accommodations are also available. There are meetings all over the world. Australia is quite active.
