Maybe, instead of one person doing the demo and then the afternoon class, we have two folks do a demo, and have the afternoon class be about basic skill training on how to use different tools, or how to sharpen your tools. Please think about that and let us know at the next meeting how you feel about occasionally changing the format of our meetings. Some chapters have a meeting in the morning, and have their class in the evening, on another day of the week. Hum....

We also discussed having several people collaborate on a project. We have done that in the past, and it worked out great. We discussed having a meeting about our greatest failures, with all of us bring something that just didn't want to turn properly; a funnel instead of a bowl, or a pen that we used the wrong bushings on, etc.



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At this time, I have a Delta table saw that is out of adjustment. The blade is not at a 90 degree angle, I can't seem to be able to get it adjusted properly. Wouldn't it be great if we had a way to help each other with these kinds of issues. For instance, I might have some wood that needed to be milled, maybe someone in the club could offer some assistance with that. Or maybe it is a turning issue, like I love to make bottle stoppers, but I have trouble with the threading... Or maybe you need help with making dovetails, so it will fit on your chuck better...

In our recent questionnaire about demos, we received responses from three people. Inperson demos, when possible. I am contacting the clubs in our state and neighboring states, to see who might be available for demos, both in-person and zoom for when we can't find an in-person demonstrator. Round robin – if or when we do a round robin, we are probably going to have to do it in the classroom area. If there is nothing else happening that morning, we can spread the lathes out.

We are also planning to have more "question and answers", panel discussions, team challenges, demos on turning tool handles, hollow forms, live edge bowls, and possibly multiaxis turning. At least that is our goal for this year.

Reminders - please remember the up-coming symposium in Louisville June 1-4. And please remember that Covid is still being transmitted. Be as safe as you can, and social distance if possible. And bring something for the raffle table if you can.

BTW, we have new lights for our classroom area. This is something we have needed, especially for cloudy afternoon and night classes.


