MAY DEMO BY TIM TINGLE & DAVID FANCHER

David Fancher: For my part of the demo,

Working with resin can take a lot of equipment. I plan to show how to make a mold using plywood and house wrap tape. It also does not require a pressure pot. A heat gun or torch will do it I used this to make a cutting board that has a resin stripe in it. This is also the technique that is used for river pour tables. This is when a slab is cut into two pieces and reversed with the straight edge becoming the outside edge and pouring resin in between. I will also be showing resin blanks that can be made using a three D printer. The files to make these are available online or you can write your own. If you don't have a printer some libraries and other groups will help. If there is time left we can also talk about clear label casting. You attach a design to a pen tube and then cast it in clear resin. There is printer paper that is made for this for you to make your own design.

I have been turning for several years, mostly doing pens. My daughter actually got me started in it after she took a class at the Phil Campbell School.

From Tim Tingle:

I've been turning for almost 5 years, turning acrylics for the last 3 years. And I started pour ing my own pen blanks and other items with resin last year. I will pass out an outline of resin basics and show the steps to correctly mix and pour resin and mention the differences be tween turning wood vs resin.

Alabama Woodworkers Association's Childrens Hospital Christmas Tree project is a ten month mission. We began this year with 22 ornaments carried over from 2023 and have collected 61 ornaments as of AWA's April meeting. Our goal is to have a tree tightly packed with ornaments on decorating day in November. It takes at least 300 ornaments on hand to reach our goal. So, we have work ahead of us!

What will it take to meet our goal for 2024? It will take a significant number of members taking the time to produce a significant number of ornaments. A few things to remember are:

- 1. We need a variety of ornaments. Variety meaning size, wood, complexi ty, and style.
- 2. Be certain to put an eye hook on top of all ornaments.
- 3. No tree hanger is necessary because we have to wire the ornament to the tree.
- 4. Add on items like birds on bird houses is desirable but the counting, sort ing, boxing, transporting is sometimes hard on the tiny birds. If you sup ply birds for your bird houses, we can glue them on when we are decorating at Childrens Hospital.
- 5. Tightly packed is not an exaggeration. Your ornament is needed. We focus on giving every ornament **pride of place**. Remember the goal is that all ornaments weigh not more than two ounces. Ornaments that weigh down the limbs are used but the ornaments weight results in a less desirable placement (closer to the trunk of the tree).

Join us by contributing ornaments this year. We need everyone's help. If you need an idea, stop and check out the ornaments being turned in for ideas. If you are into segmentation, make segmented ornaments. Add fancy finals, if that is your thing. Bells, light bulbs, small Christmas trees, small angels, candles, and even beehives are a big hit. A few fancy one of a kind ornaments are great but we also need ornaments that can be massed produced with much larger numbers submitted. Thanks to everyone who has turned in ornaments. It does take a village to decorate a Christmas tree with turned ornaments!!!

Each year a member volunteers to turn the tree topper. Susan McCalla has volunteered for the 2024 tree. Susan is known for her lovely angels. I am sure the top of the tree will take on a different look this year. As "they" say, variety is the spice of Christmas Trees. Many thanks to Susan for taking on this challenge.




