### LEE FERGUSON WILL BE DOING OUR MARCH DEMO







## WHAT MAURICE HAS BEEN DOING



H.R. # 13 "Shallow Pond and Sweeping Plain"
Bark edged winged offset suspended bowl
17" I x 10.5" w x .5" h
(Rest on the bark edges)



H.R.#10 "CRATER" SIZE- 10" W X 3" H X .375" T
BARK EDGED "BIRD SHOT" RED OAK BURL
INSPIRATION- THE NAME AND SHAPE FOR THIS BOWL/
SCULPTURE WAS DETERMINED BY THE SHAPE OF THE
CHARRED HOLE BLOWN OUT OF ONE SIDE. THE PATH OF THE
LIGHTNING STRIKE WAS VERY EVIDENT IN THE RAW BLANK.
RATHER THAN DISCARDING THIS FEATURE, CLABAUGH HIGHLIGHTED IT IN A BOWL SHAPE THAT EMPHASIZE THE
CHARRED FEATURE. THE BARK ON THE SIDES CONTRAST TO
THE SMOOTH INTERIOR POCK MARKED, FURTHER EMPHASIZES THE BLACK CHARRED SLASH WHICH STARTS IN THE CENTER OF THE BOWL, CASCADES THOUGH THE SIDE, AND RIPPLES LIKE BLACK LAVA SPILLING FROM THE CRATER.

THE INTERIOR OF "CRATER" IS POCKED WITH "BIRD SHOT" DAMAGE DISTORTING THE BURL'S FIGURE SEEN IN OTHER VESSELS IN THIS COLLECTION.
